Exercise and Lifestyle

Rehabilitation and Exercise in Advanced Cancer Health (REACH)

- Who can join: People in Canada diagnosed with advanced or metastatic breast cancer
- Focus: Understanding rehabilitation and exercise needs
- Led by: Faculty of Rehabilitation Medicine, University of Alberta
- Format: Anonymous online survey (in English and French)

Ms. FIT Breast Cancer (BC) Study

- Who can join: People who have experienced early-stage breast cancer, are postmenopausal and have taken an aromatase inhibitor for at least 12 months.
- Focus: Impact of physical activity and diet guidelines on heart health and quality of life
- Led by: Kirkham Lab, Faculty of Kinesiology and Physical Education, University of Toronto
- Format: In person at the University of Toronto

Sedentary Behaviour Priorities Study

- Who can join: Adults 65+ years old with a cancer diagnosis at any time, and caregivers of older adults with cancer
- Focus: Identifying research priorities about sedentary behaviour
- Led by: Health Behaviour and Emotion Lab, Faculty of Kinesiology and Physical Education, University of Toronto
- Format: Surveys and/or focus groups

Insomnia and Cancer Survivorship Study

- Who can join: People diagnosed with breast cancer in Canada
- Focus: Experiences with insomnia and access to treatment
- Led by: Behavioural Medicine Lab, University of Calgary
- Format: Short online survey

Young Adult Survivorship Engagement

- Who can join: Young adults (ages 15-39) diagnosed and/or treated for breast cancer in British Columbia
- Focus: Recruiting community researchers, especially those with diverse gender identities, ethnicities or rural backgrounds
- Led by: BC Cancer Research Institute
- Format: Participation in a virtual group session and small group exercises to codesign an equitable survivorship care program for young adults

The RECOVER Study: Understanding Life Beyond Treatment for Young Adult Cancer Survivors

- Who can join: Canadian's aged 18+ who were diagnosed with any type of cancer before age 40
- Focus: Understanding the long-term mental, physical, social, and financial well-being of young adult cancer survivors
- Led by: Young Adult Cancer Canada (YACC)
- Format: Annual online survey (30-45 minutes) for up to five years; participants received \$20 per year and may be invited to optional interviews or focus groups

The START Study: Exploring Gender-Based Violence and Breast Cancer

 Who can join: Women, 18 years or older who have experienced a breast cancer diagnosis and received cancer care in Canada

- Focus: How childhood and relationship experiences, including gender-based violence, affect treatment and outcomes
- Led by: Women's Health Matters Research Team, Western University
- Format: Confidential online survey

Early Onset Cancer Pan-Tumour Patient Survey

- Who can join: Canadians diagnosed with cancer between 18-49 in the last 10 years, plus caregivers or representatives completing on behalf of a patient when needed
- Focus: Exploring clinical, psychosocial, and support needs and gaps during treatment and survivorship; specifically understanding access to hospital-affiliated multidisciplinary clinics or programs for early age onset cancer patients
- Led by: Colorectal Cancer Resource & Action Network (CCRAN)
- Format: One-time online survey (about 14 minutes to complete); caregivers may complete it on behalf of patients' responses confidential and will inform national advocacy initiatives
