# **Patient navigation**

Patients often feel that going through breast cancer treatment is often like trying to find their way through a maze. Breast cancer patient navigation is a service that helps guide cancer patients and their families through this maze. The navigator works closely with you, your family doctor, the cancer team and other caregivers to help you get the best care possible. They guide you through the physical, emotional and often financial challenges that come with a cancer diagnosis.

While breast cancer or cancer patient navigation programs vary across Canada, they all help you to make informed decisions and help you to access the support you need in a timely manner. Note that some provinces and territories do not yet have cancer or breast cancer navigation programs in place. If your community does not offer specialized patient navigators, it may be beneficial to reach out to social workers at your cancer centres.

### <u>Alberta</u>

The Alberta Health Services Cancer Patient Navigator provides clients and their families by:

- Providing accurate information for patients so they can make informed decisions about their next steps
- Helping patients prepare for tests and cancer treatments by explaining test results and treatment choices or by referring patients to other resources or services
- Improving coordination of care by working with other healthcare providers
- Helping patients prepare for medical visits by explaining ahead of time what to expect
- Helping patients access financial resources and community supports

# <u>Ontario</u>

 Cancer Care Ontario's Aboriginal Patient Navigators provide support and advocacy for First Nations Metis and Inuit (FNIM) patients and families by facilitating and coordinating access to cancer services for palliative and supportive care, addressing cultural and spiritual needs, and networking with FNIM and non-Aboriginal partners to make the cancer journey a culturally safe experience.

While Cancer Care Ontario does not currently have a formalized patient navigation program for non-aboriginal residents many, if not all, cancer centres in Ontario, offer similar services through social workers that can assist in providing further information about your cancer diagnosis, treatment and can help you access community resources.
- 3. **Oncology Drug Access Navigators of Ontario (ODANO)** is a provincial organization founded to provide support, advocate for members, share resources and educate existing and new navigators in order to maximize the appropriate funding for all cancer patients. Their primary goal is to remove the financial burden from the patient so they can focus on their health. Navigators act as resident experts on drug coverage and criteria for coverage. They facilitate drug coverage by:
  - Accessing government funding
  - Accessing patient assistance programs
  - Finding other reimbursement means for unfunded drugs
